Thanks from St Ismael

St Ismael's Church Rosemarket would like to thank all those people who supported the church in anyway during 1999. Fund raising for the renovation of the church played an important part during the year. An application for funding with a Heritage National Lottery grant has been made. If successful the church will still have to find over £9,000.00.

In the early part of last year the annual sale of daffodils raised £686.00. In April Hilda and Rhys Jones organised a highly successful dance raising £530.00. The Pembrokeshire and District Male Voice Choir entertained on our gift day. In September David and Margaret Wildman held a garden party which, with the £330.00 from the sale of jams and Christmas decorations provided by Mrs. Rosie John and family, raised £1,215.00.

The church, in November, provided a packed to capacity Olde Tyme Music Hall evening raising a further £313.00. On top of that the children of the flourishing Tuesday School donated £100.00-- Well Done.

WISH I WAS YOUNG AGAIN

Haverfordwest Gymnastics Club recently held its inter-club competition in the Gymnasium at Sir Thomas Picton School. County Councillor David Wildman, one of the invited guests, presented medals to some of the winners. Several children are from the Burton and Rosemarket area.

The major aim for the year 2000 is to raise enough funds to buy their own Gymnasium. At present they experience many problems, such as time and space, the gymnasium is used by many others and at the end of each session all equipment must be stored away and then lifted out again at the start of the next session. This has implications in respect of Health and Safety, much of the equipment

is heavy, and this puts volunteers and gymnasts at risk of back and other injuries.

The club has over 200 members whose ages range from 3-16. Due to lack of suitable space in the sports centre the 3-5 age group have their sessions in the hall at Prendergast Junior School. Every week 9 sessions of gymnastics are held and prior to competitions extra sessions need to be fitted in.

Gymnastics is an excellent sport; it offers young people a safe environment to develop their athletic ability. It improves strength, flexibility, agility, muscular endurance, static and dynamic balance, speed, sense of rhythm, posture, body tension and coordination. It helps to improve self-esteem, determination, perseverance, self-respect, expressiveness, self-confidence and above all discipline.

Too often we hear about young people in trouble, here we have 200 young people doing something positive and productive with their lives.

The club, unfortunately, does not have adequate facilities to host competitions in Pembrokeshire. So, they have to travel, often as far a field as Cardiff. Gymnastics allows young people to develop positive skills and is also a good basis for all other sporting activities.


Those who have special needs can also benefit from gymnastics and 3 of our volunteers are, at present, waiting for a course.



Burton Community Action Group

The three sub-committees held a joint meeting last October and invited the Community Council to attend together with Keith Thomas PCC Youth Development Officer and Phillip Bowen the Mentor Preseli representative. Dennis Venables Chairman of Burton Community Council chaired the meeting.

The purpose of the meeting was to update and inform those present of the progress made by the various committees.

Martin Charles, Chairman of the Youth, Recreation and Sport sub-committee started the reporting.

Play Area

Anthony Kroch had undertaken considerable work into looking at upgrading the play area opposite the school. This included site visits, liaison with suppliers for specifications and more importantly involving the children. Quotations were awaited before discussing funding with Alex Allison of Mentor Preseli.

Youth Club

A number of meetings have taken place over the past months discussing and obtaining information in order to begin forming a new Keith Thomas PCC Youth club. Development Officer has been actively involved. He advised that the Council would offer support and help with the planning and finding equipment etc but no financial help.

One stumbling block has been finding a youth leader. Councillor David Wildman introduced Colin Rogers of Rosemarket who is a parent himself and has had previous experience.

Tennis Courts

Mr Rowell Headmaster of Burton School advised that the LEA is willing for courts to be marked out in the school playground.

Philip Bowen will liaise with Alex Allison regarding plans for levelling and marking of the area.

Philip Bowen reported on behalf of the Environment Group.

Interpretation Panel

This was to be sited near the Jolly Sailor at Burton Ferry.

mock-up been produced and has considered by the group and David Davies-Sage is now engaged on the final round of research.

Consent has been requested from Pembrokeshire County Council to erect this panel.

An artist's impression has been produced by Les Evans detailing the site and enhancement works. This has received approval.

Enhancement at Sardis Cross

Again an artist's impression has been produced and passed to the County Council for approval.

Enhancement of Village Signs

Details have been passed on for approval.

Seats

Seats have been erected at Barnlake Point and at the start of the bridleway to Houghton Moor.

Ice Factory Plaque

The County Council has been requested to include this in the maintenance schedule.

Cleddau Bridge Picnic Area

The County council has been asked to improve the view by reducing the canopies of the resident trees.

Sponsored Walk

Over 50 people took part in the walk, led by Dennis Venables, from Burton Church via Benton Castle and ending in the school

Continued from previous page playground where guests and the walkers enjoyed a Bar-B-Que prepared by Mervyn Williams and Roger Davies. The walkers were soon pressing Dennis to plan another walk. The walk raised £237.00 for the Group's funds.

Housing, Services and Transport group received a report from Bob Scott on - New Community Hall

A site meeting took place in June when it was agreed to seek permission from the Diocesan Trust to build a hall on the Church field adjacent to Houghton Green. Strong objections were later raised about this course of action.

It was then proposed that the hall should be built in the school ground. The maximum lease that the Diocesan trust can offer is 21 years; a concession has been made by the lottery to allow this rather than it's normal 25 year requirement.

A public meeting would have to be held to obtain agreement to sell the Jubilee Hall. After further discussion it was agreed to hold another sight visit. Is it necessary to have a new hall was questioned?

Brian Symmons reported on Transport

Concern was voiced at the volume and speed of traffic through the Parish following the bridge closure.

Other concerns on traffic management:

County Council will not act unless there is a high rate of <u>reported</u> accidents.

The police have manpower problems but are increasing surveillance.

The Community Council recently held a meeting with the Police and Highways Dept.

A letter has been received by the committee, from the County Council in respect of the traffic problems.

The school survey (800 vehicles per hour) was forwarded to the Council.

Follow up correspondence to keep pressure on the Council was decided as the best way forward.

Cookery Corner

WELSH CAKES

12 ozs. S.R. Flour 6 ozs. Butter 4 ozs. Caster sugar 1 Lge. Egg 4 ozs. Currants ½ tsp.Mixed spice

METHOD

Rub butter into flour, sugar and mixed spice. Add currants.

Add egg and bind all ingredients together. If dry add a small amount of milk.

Transfer the dough on to a lightly floured surface.

Roll it out to about ¼inch(5mm) thick. Using a 2 ½-inch(6.5mm) cutter, cut into rounds.

Heat heavy duty plank/griddle over medium heat.

Cook for about 3 minutes each side.

Makes approx. 30 Welsh Cakes.
