Mr David John, Strategic Co-ordinator, for Menter Preseli attended the meeting. A Constitution was discussed and it was agreed to have one with charitable status to cover the three sub-committees.

Application for a lottery grant, for the play area adjacent to Burton School, is to be deferred until the Pembrokeshire County Council's policy document, on it's future role regarding play areas, is decided.



You Have Got to Try It To Believe it

CAN'T STOP SMILING FRUIT CAKE

Ingredients:

1 cup water

1 bowl sugar

4 eggs

2 cups dried fruit

1 teaspoon baking soda

2 1/2 cups plain flour

1 cup brown sugar

1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence

1 cup chopped nuts

lemon juice

1 large bottle of your favourite whisky

Method:

Sample whisky for freshness and quality. Get a large mixing bowl and check the whisky again, just to be sure. Pour one level cup of whiskey, drink and repeat just to be absholutely poshitive. Garden Birds

Recent surveys of the British bird population have shown a dramatic decline in some of the more common species. Many of us will have noticed that skylarks and lapwings are now far less common than they were, say twenty or thirty years ago. However it is a shock to learn that birds that formed a familiar background to our daily lives, such as the house sparrow, song thrush, and starling, are now falling in numbers.

On the other hand, there are some species, such as the collared dove and the greenfinch, that have gained ground in recent times. The greenfinch is a very frequent visitor to the feeders in the garden and can show extremely aggressive behaviour towards other birds.

The increasing number of people who provide food and water for birds in their gardens are doing a great deal to sustain garden birds populations during the winter months. And the regular recording of garden birds by the public is of vital importance in giving information on the fluctuations of bird movement and population.

For a year now I have been recording garden birds for The British Trust for Ornithology. For a £10 annual membership fee, which goes towards costs of administration, you are sent charts on which to compile weekly records of birds visiting your garden. The completed charts are then returned to The Trust at quarterly intervals.

Just outside the kitchen window . I have placed three types of wild bird food: peanuts, sunflower seed, and a cylinder of fat that incorporates dried insects. I also provide water.

Greenfinches, Chaffinches, Dunnocks, blue and great tits and a robin are daily visitors, and quite often a pair of collared doves fly down to pick up any fallen seed. I've also made regular recordings of coal and marsh tits, and during March, a siskin has made a number of visits to the peanut feeder. The siskin is a good example of a species that is becoming more widespread in Pembrokeshire. This increase in numbers has coincided with the increase in coniferous plantations in the county. For example, in Pantmaerog Forest and Canaston Woods; but during the winter months siskins are also attracted to gardens where nut feeders have been provided which has been an important factor in maintaining rising population or these attractive little birds.

Our New Zealand Holiday by Mel Griffiths of Houghton

After Mandy had spent a few days in Houghton we all travelled to the airport where our holiday were to start with a flight from Heathrow, on Sunday January 16th at 12 o clock, landing at Los Angeles for a few hours, then on to Auckland, New Zealand, arriving there at 6.15 am on Tuesday January 18th. We were greeted by beautiful sunshine, much too hot to stand out in, what a contrast from Great Britain. From there we flew to Christ Church, located in South Island, New Zealand where we were met by our son Lewis and his family. After a warm welcome, we travelled by car for one hour to Ashburton, where the family live. The whole journey was much better than we first expected, and we could hardly believe that we had actually arrived in New Zealand. Lewis had arrange to have two weeks off from his practice. After a few days to allow recovery from our journey, he was able to take us around and show us some sights of his adopted country.

The first thing we noticed, especially around Canterbury, were the straight wide roads which ran for miles, with the railway running along the side of the road (unfenced). It was also strange to see farmers busy combining wheat, barley and rye grass, also hay making and lifting early potatoes, all in January. Also a large acreage of Borage which has a blue flower, grown for it's herb use. We also noticed in Ashburton, how clean the streets were, and I was told that cats are a much favoured pet to dogs, this was noticeable by very few dogs that were to be seen around the area.

Farmers, I believe, do not receive subsidies, but most seem to survive pretty well. Dairy farmers, block calve their herds and manage a month or two off milking in winter. Cattle are wintered out, as there are very few buildings on the farm, except for the farms which supply the factory with milk for household use. They have to keep going all the year but get a little reward in the price they get for their milk.

I was informed that quite a few sheep farmers were gradually changing over to deer, which was showing slightly more profit. Also on our trips through the country I noticed several stud farms, horse racing and especially trotting is very popular in New Zealand. Some fields were fenced with wire and posts, others, with tall trees such as Poplar, Pine and Eucalyptus grown to a height of 15-20 feet. Irrigation is also a necessity. Another novelty were the private mail boxes outside each property, some were just practical boxes on posts, but some residents had really gone wild with their designs, such as wheelbarrows, tractors all made up from bits and pieces.

We spent a few days at Dunedin one of New Zealand's oldest towns, we also took a coach trip to Queenstown where we stayed for a few day, while there, we were able to take another coach trip to Milford Sound. That trip was really lovely, beautiful scenery, alongside snow capped mountains, through forests, over creeks, along the side of mountains through tunnels and very twisted roads with very few crash barriers. At Milford Sound we had a trip on the 'Milford Monarch' to see the sights.

Then it was back to Ashburton, to spend another week with the family, before departing on Saturday February12th when we flew from Christchurch to Brisbane in Australia, to visit our cousin, leaving there on Wednesday February 16th. We flew from Brisbane to Auckland, then to Los Angeles and onward to Heathrow. On arrival we were met by another cousin and we then spent a few days in London relaxing and recovering from the long flight home. We eventually arrived back at our daughters home, where we received a very warm welcome from Rose and our three granddaughters. The finale, to our epic journey was made complete, not only with the warm welcome, but also, our favourite meal was waiting on the table.



The Garden in March

By now many gardeners will have received by mail those neatly packaged boxes of seed from well known merchants such as Marshalls, Dobies, Suttons or Unwins. But this year, on a whim, I decided to buy my seeds from the local nursery. Actually seeing those rows and rows of flowers and vegetables seeds in their racks; the lines or the open sacks of seed potatoes, and the buckets brimful with peas and beans has, I think, the edge over selecting from a catalogue – even though now paper has replaced the former jute sacks, and black plastic the former shiny zinc buckets.

As every year when choosing seeds, my imagination leaps from the seductive illustrations on the packets to a vision of my own flourishing crop of succulent vegetables and to the blazing colours of my own summer herbaceous bed, perennially forgetting the crop failures when, after careful raking to a fine tilth as the instruction in the books advise, your sowing is followed either by weeks of cold and wet, or else by an exceptional period of drought; or that, if and when the shoots do appear they are often quickly devastated by slugs, birds and snails.

The beginning of March was wet with cold winds, followed by some warm dry days. But it has been a fickle month, and fickleness seems to be the main feature of all our spring months. When it is fine enough to get out into the garden you are faced with a thousand jobs that need to be tackled. Then it can be difficult to decide which one should get priority. If you grow vegetables then it is the vegetable patch that needs to be seen to first of all. Vegetable gardeners, always hoping that there won't be a severe late frost, like to set a row of earlies and sow a row of peas and beans as soon as possible in the month and also a row of parsnips which like a long growth period (although I know that older and wiser gardeners advise never to be in too much of a hurry!).

During these last fine days I have been able to cut the grass and set a row of early potatoes. I do not use artificial fertiliser, but over the years I have dug in sackfuls of seaweed hauled up on my shoulders from the beach at Burton Ferry – a lengthy procedure as each trench takes four sackfuls! The crops do well, although I admit that, as a back-up, I hoe in handfuls of the concentrated dried manure.

By the time this article was due to be submitted I had hoped to boast that I have now sown my early peas, a row of broad beans and a row of parsnips. But punishment for pride was waiting in the wings in a form of a heavy downfall or a bitterly cold wind.

Still the main and abiding quality that a gardener must learn is patience. Only won perhaps, after years of battling with and maybe gracious submission to our fickle climate.

Railway Recollections

Footplate Experience of 1962(No.1.)

Some of you living in the parishes of Burton and Rosemarket who know me personally, will also be aware of the fact, that I have held a lifelong fascination for railways. Therefore, I was delighted to be asked by County Councillor David Wildman, to share some of my recollections with readers of the Burton and Rosemarket Newsletter.

I've no doubt that my enthusiasm for railways stemmed from the fact that, my mother's parents, Joseph and Lily Price, farmed at North Hayston, near Johnston, and the Milford Haven branch line passed near to the farmhouse. I spent much of my young life there, and subsequently became familiar with the variety of trains that passed to and fro. The majority of locomotives to be seen were former Great Western types, ranging from the humble pannier tanks, which did shunting, and short- haul passenger and goods duties, to the famous Castle Class engines which had charge of Express Passenger, and Fish trains. Of all these fine locomotives, the one type which caught my attention most, was the County Class, designed by GWR Chief Mechanical Engineer F.W. Hawksworth, introduced to traffic in 1945.

The Counties, strong workhorses though they were, never managed to endear themselves to footplate crews to the same degree as the Castles and Granges, though there were usually four of the Counties shedded at Neyland, and were generally kept in good fettle. One of these engines, No. 1027 County of Stafford, was particularly well maintained, and has always had a place in my heart. It was aboard this engine that I had my first footplate ride when I was nearly 13 years old, and this is my story.

During the school holidays of summer 1962, I was staying at North Hayston with my grandfather when, one day, I received a message from my uncle, William Jacob, who kept the Forester's Arms, at Neyland. Some of my uncle's regular customers were railwaymen, and amongst these was driver Billy Harrison, who, through my uncle, had learned my love of railways, and had expressed a wish to meet me. Such a meeting was duly arranged, at the Forester's Arms, one July morning in 1962.

Aunty Violet kindly allowed Billy and I the use of her living-room for our discussion. From the onset, it was clear that Billy was keen that I should have the thrilling experience of riding in the cab of a steam locomotive. When he knew how much I admired County of Stafford, he began to make plans for me to ride on her footplate. Approximately a week later, on a Thursday morning, we met again. Everything had been finalised for my trip, which would commence that evening, at Milford Haven station at 8.50.pm. With overwhelming excitement, I cycled back to my grandfather with this wonderful news.

Billy had explained to me that County of Stafford was being used that day, to haul an eleven coach excursion from Milford Haven to Tenby and back. Billy would be her driver for the return journey, when, after getting the passengers safely back to Milford, he would have to return the empty coaches to Neyland. It was on this part of the journey that I would be accompanying Billy.

Because the excursion would not be stopping at Johnston on it's homeward journey, it meant me having to travel from Johnston to Milford Haven by an earlier train, so that I could meet up with Billy Harrison at the scheduled time of 8.50.pm. Grandpa accompanied me to Johnston station that evening, saw that I had my ticket, and we crossed via the footbridge, to the Down platform to await the train from Paddington which arrived, hauled by GWR Mogul No. 7340. I climbed into one of the coaches. At 6.50.pm. the guard's whistle blew, and with a wave of his green flag, we steamed off towards Milford Haven - what excitement.
